PURPOSE

To advise the Committee of the Claremont Museum's activities for the period of June to August 2022.

BACKGROUND

An updated report is provided to the Committee for each quarter of the year, which includes data on the Education Program, Collection management, events and visitation statistics for the quarter.

In summary, it is pleasing to report that in this June to August quarter, the attendance numbers for July and August are slightly higher than the last recorded figures (2016) as outlined below.

2. Education Program

The education program has recommenced, with Monday and Tuesday mornings reserved for this program.

Bookings with only a few days left that are not booked. So far, groups from Iona Presentation, Dalkeith Primary, Swanbourne Primary, Moerlina School, St Hilda's Anglican School and Rehoboth Cristian College have all attended.

A Year 2 class from Swanbourne Primary came to the museum on Tuesday, August 2nd to take part in a special ceremony marking Her Majesty the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. Mayor Jock Barker spoke with the children on the importance of this milestone event and then everyone went outside to help plant three trees for the occasion. Cr Suann and Cr Telford also attended.

On Thursday, September 8th at 9:30am, the Museum will launch its first guided tour based on the *Claremont Meanders* walking trails. Three volunteers have signed up to lead the four tours that will be held on designated days throughout the year and possibly by request for group bookings. For five dollars, participants will have a tour that ranges from one to two hours and includes a rewarding cup of coffee at a local café to finish the morning. Bookings can be made through Trybooking.

3. Collection Management

Over two full days, the Museum's collection was moved into 282 Stirling Highway. This location allows staff to access artefacts quickly (no travel time) and has reduced expenditure for the lease.

Officers are continuing to work on two major projects.

- 1) The first project is scanning early donor receipt forms that were done on old carbon copy receipt pads. These forms are fading quickly and the information is in danger of being lost.
- 2) The second project is the indexing of the Museum's oral history collection making them far more usable for research purposes.

4. Research Requests

The Town received 24 research requests for the quarter – which took approximately 7.5 hours.

FINANCIAL AND STAFF IMPLICATIONS

The Education Program relies heavily on volunteers to help manage the number of children and the different activities. At this stage, the volunteer numbers are not reflective of the hours required to run 2 days per week. Further recruitment of volunteers is required, and this will be a focus for staff in the next quarter.

Regarding income some of the programs have a minimal charge associated to partially cover facilitator / workshop fees are included as follows:

Lost Skills workshops \$25 per head (held on a Sunday)
Education Program \$12 per student (held Mondays and Tuesdays)

All expenditure is within the budgeted allocation.

Consultation

Museum staff had a meeting with representatives of the Claremont Group of the WA Embroidery Guild to collaborate on an upcoming project. A requirement of the Guild is for each local group to create a piece to be exhibited as part of a 2024 exhibition. The Claremont Group has decided to create a piece that somehow encapsulates some of Claremont's rich history. The piece will then be gifted to the Museum for its 50th birthday in 2025. It will replace one that was gifted to the Town in 2001 and was destroyed in the 2010 fire.

Tales from the recent dreamtimes

Julianne Wade's mural across the renovated Claremont Museum has sparked dozens of stories about the area, and it isn't finished yet.

"People park up, see the fish and then tell you their stories," Whadjuk artist Julianne said.

"I think fishing and water, and the flow of the water, resonates with a lot of people."

Julianne drew inspiration from stories told by local Aboriginal man Koori Bodney.

"He was talking about the fish and the prawns and the old campgrounds and using the fish nets," she said.

"I've taken that and referenced the river with bream and prawns, and on the other side I've referenced the land, painting the bain or 'pig-face' and their flowers.

"I will have men holding a spear between the flowers so it's like looking

between the river and the shoreline."

When the work is finished, fish nets will be fashioned in metal and welded to the wall to create a 3D element.

The Claremont Museum website says Koori Bodney was born in 1932 in bush off Alfred Road, land that is now occupied by Swanbourne Primary School.

"It's been a camping ground for Aboriginal people for thousands of years, you know," the website says, writing from Koori's perspective.

"Down by the river here was one of our main camps for fishing and crabbing.

"Our people were fish eaters – mullet, cobbler, bream, crabs and prawns.

"It was beautiful here in the summertime.

"We'd sleep in the long grass, didn't worry about blankets.

"We got water in an old kerosene

bucket from a tap at the back of the police station."

Julianne said she noticed while working at the river what a beautiful place it would be to camp.

"This would be a perfect area for camping because it's hot during the morning and in the afternoon it's quite cool and the wind seems quite still here," she said.

"The birds have been amazing to watch, too – the crows have been trying to invade the magpies' areas and a couple of kookaburras have been chased by magpies."

Claremont mayor Jock Barker said he thought the mural was "fabulous".

"It pays respect to the fact that the Aboriginal community lived around here and does it in such a way that it's instantly understandable by people who might not know a lot about Aboriginal culture," he said.
