**Do not overfill bins and ensure lids are firmly closed so items do not spill out**

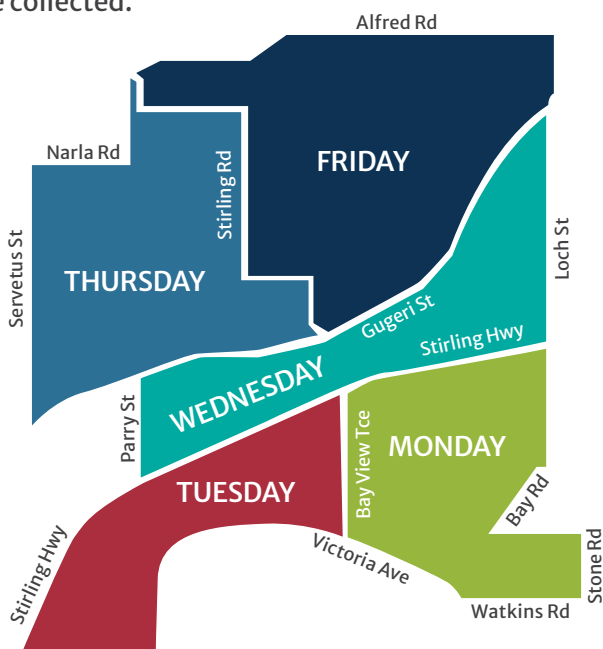
**Place bins away from other objects with the front facing the street**

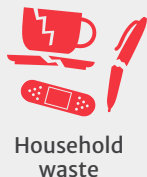
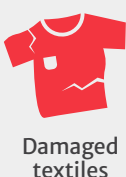
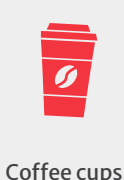

## Weekly Collection

### General waste



### HAZARDOUS ITEMS DO NOT BELONG IN ANY KERBSIDE BIN



Batteries



Aerosols



Paint



Gas bottles

These items can cause facility or truck fires and damage to the environment. Bring them to the West Metro Recycling Centre or search [recycleright.wa.gov.au/find-my-nearest](https://recycleright.wa.gov.au/find-my-nearest) for drop-off points.



### B-Cycle

When recycled correctly, 95% of battery components can be reclaimed. Give batteries another life with B-Cycle, Australia's national battery recycling scheme. Many retailers now have B-Cycle collection points instore – check [bcycle.com.au](https://bcycle.com.au) to find a location close to you.

## Household Hazardous Waste (HHW)

HHW includes unwanted household products that are flammable, corrosive, explosive, or contain harmful chemicals. Up to 20kg or 20L per material type per visit will be accepted **free of charge**.

- Acids & alkalis
- Aerosols & spray cans
- Batteries
- Engine coolants
- Fire extinguishers (red only)
- Flares
- Gas cylinders
- Household cleaners
- Light globes & fluorescent tubes
- Paint
- Pesticides/herbicides
- Pool chemicals
- Smoke detectors
- Waste motor oil
- Unknown chemicals – must be in a secure, sealed container

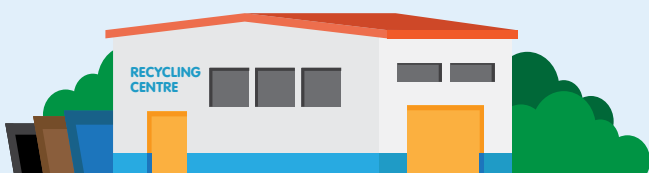

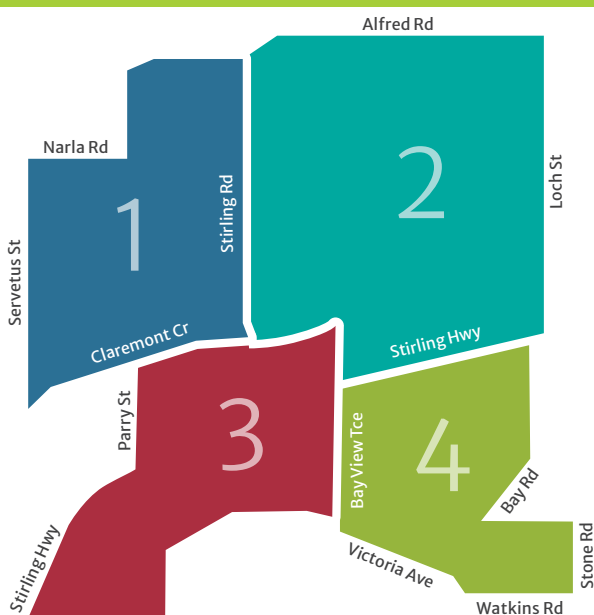

# GREEN WASTE & BULK WASTE COLLECTIONS



**Bulk and green waste need to be placed on the verge on the weekend before your zone's scheduled collection date.**

Bulk waste is collected by multiple trucks. It's important that you **DO NOT** place out additional waste once part of your waste has been collected as the truck that collects that type of waste has already been.



## Green Waste Collections

Up to **one** cubic metre of the following items will be collected:

- ✓ Bags of leaves and small pieces of vegetation
- ✓ Branches, cuttings and leaves (max length 1.5 metres and max diameter 150mm)



The following items will **NOT** be collected:

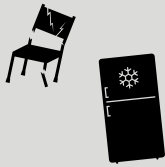
- ✗ Branches over 1.5 metres in length
- ✗ Branches over 200mm in diameter
- ✗ Bulk or household waste
- ✗ Leaves in plastic bags
- ✗ Large tree trunks or stumps

Greenwaste bags for small cuttings can be purchased from the Town's Administration building for \$6.00 each.

## Bulk Waste Collections

The following items will be collected:

- ✓ General junk. Items longer than 1.2 metres in length need to be dismantled (eg. trampolines, playground equipment)
- ✓ Old furniture
- ✓ Refrigerators (doors removed) and other whitegoods
- ✓ Stoves (doors removed)



The following items will **NOT** be collected:

- ✗ Asbestos and cement products
- ✗ Bricks, tiles, concrete, sand, rubble
- ✗ Building materials and timber
- ✗ Car batteries
- ✗ E-waste (eg. computers and TVs)
- ✗ Flammable liquids and oil
- ✗ Foodstuffs (household food waste)
- ✗ Gas bottles
- ✗ Glass (eg. panes, mirrors, tabletops)
- ✗ Green waste
- ✗ Mattresses
- ✗ Motor vehicles (whole or parts)
- ✗ Paint and chemicals

Many of these items can be taken to the West Metro Recycling Centre instead – some are free and some for a fee. Check the previous page for details.

# FOOD WASTE

Without meaning to, we're wasting twice as much food as we think – Australian households throw away the equivalent of **7.7 million meals** every day.

## What is food waste?

Any food that ends up in the bin instead of being eaten is food waste. Some food waste (like bones and peels) isn't edible, but most food waste (70%) is actually edible, so the best place for it is on our plates, not in the bin.

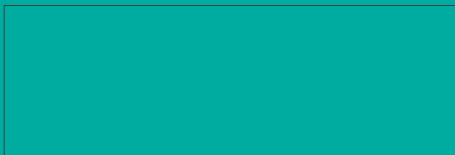
