

In their own world

This year, young people were asked to capture an image that reflected their perspective of being 'in their own world'.




The Town's annual Youth Photographic Competition, open to all young people aged between 12-18 years who reside in and/or go to school in the western suburbs, had 64 entries this year.

Judge and Cr Ryan Brown said "I really enjoy being part of this project, seeing young people's creativity depict the world through their own lens so to speak. There is a stillness and quietness to many of the works this year, which I found fascinating."

Cr Brown was joined by Bianca Venturi – Presbyterian Ladies' College and Rob Di Giallonardo – John XXIII College, to make the difficult choice of winners for each category.

Shortlisted artworks will be on display at the Claremont Museum between 29 May – 10 June during museum opening hours. Visitors can vote for their favourite photograph for the People's Choice category at the exhibition or online via the QR code.



Trees stand trial

Together with Treeswest, the Town has begun a new treatment trial to stop the Polyphagous shot-hole borer (PSHB) wreaking havoc across the Town's tree canopy.

This trial uses funnel traps coated in an attracting chemical which mimics the scent of the Box Elder tree, the preferred host for PSHB. The trees are then injected with a mixture of insecticide and fungicide which inhibits fungal growth almost immediately.

Pleasingly for the Town's tree canopy, early signs are showing promising results with many beetles being captured in the traps.

The Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development have placed log traps in the eastern buffer on Lake Claremont where the highest infestation of the borer is believed to be to draw them out of the bushland.

Cr Sara Franklyn said initiatives like this will help the combat the borer.

"Everyone here at the Town is encouraged by the results so far and how well it's working," she said.

"The Town is known for its lush green canopy and it's pleasing to see this trial positively supporting this asset."

PSHB was first detected in East Fremantle in August 2021 and since then has been found across 30 Local Government areas in WA.

The beetle helps the growth of a fungus inside the tree which then kills it by restricting or preventing water and nutrients moving throughout it.


Other local Governments across Western Australia have taken part in this trial with similar results.

Bird waterer

In February, a Bird Watering Station was installed at Lake Claremont.

This design provides a permanent fresh water supply for birdlife, to help protect vulnerable bird species in a drying climate. The waterer is located three to four metres above the ground to ensure for the birds' safety while avoiding inference to the water supply.

The Town worked closely with Birdlife Australia in selecting the optimal location for the device to be installed. The bird waterer can be found in the northeast corner of the Lake Claremont bushland – near the Friends of Lake Claremont shed.

Support in sport

Celebrating NAIDOC Week.

Maley Hayward became the first Aboriginal player to represent Claremont in league football more than 90 years ago and since then many more Aboriginal players have played for the club.

Today, there are 10 Aboriginal players across the club's League, WAFLW, Reserves, Colts, Rogers Cup and Futures teams.

Over the past 60 years, the Claremont Football Club (CFC) has been at the forefront of pathways for Aboriginal WAFL players. This enables both Aboriginal men and women to develop their football skills and give them a purpose in life.

Indigenous Broome woman and CFC Rogers Cup player Jasmine Roberts spoke of her love of the sport.

"The best thing about playing football is the support, experiences and belonging I have with my mentors and team players," she said.

"When I play football my relationship with my team is supportive in many ways, such as making me feel important, strong and to be the best version of myself.

"Playing football gives me a sense of relief as well as a boost of confidence," she added.

Seniors Men's player Eric Benning has excelled for the Claremont Tigers in recent years, playing for both the League and Reserves sides.

"The highlight of my football career was playing my first League game with Claremont," Eric said.

"All the people and the support in and around the footy club make the CFC a great place," he added.

Not just helping her fitness, Rogers Cup player Sienna McLaren said the Claremont community helps her grow.

"I love the community that has been created and how close all the girls are. It's a super fun and challenging environment that has let me grow so much as a person," she said.


For those wanting to play for the Tigers, Jasmine, Eric and Sienna said to go for it.


"Chase every opportunity you are given and believe in yourself," Jasmine said.

A stitch in time

A recent gift from the
Claremont Embroidery Group
has revealed several wellstitched landmarks around
the Town, in a competent
piece now hanging in the
Town's Freshwater Bay Gallery.

The Group, an affiliate group of the Embroiderer's Guild WA, has gifted the piece to commemorate the Museum's 50th anniversary.

Based on selected imagery from the Museum, the needlework depicts eighteen individually embroidered pieces of Claremont's history, preserving the memory of these icons.

This is the second piece that the Claremont Embroidery Group has donated to the Town, sadly a piece was destroyed in a fire at Claremont Council in 2010.

Group leader Sandy Nicholson said the group wanted to stitch moments in Claremont's history and the fact it was also the Museum's 50th anniversary was extra special.

The group applied to the Town through the Community Funding Program, enabling them to frame these completed embroidery works.



What's all the buzz about

The rear wall at the Bay View Community Centre has come alive with the addition of a new mural as part of the Town's Youth Mural Mentorship program.

This year, Jack Collis and Daisy Fethers were mentored by WA artist and animator Peter Ryan to design, create and paint a new public mural.

The mural, titled Busy Bees, depicts people from the community on one side – including a librarian, creative kids and sporty teens – controlling the strings (like puppets) of bees on the other side which are building a garden.

It's a vibrant, lively and community friendly piece designed to bring joy and a pop of colour to the <u>area</u>.

"The concept [of the mural] was about community working together and building a garden, using creative imagery of puppeteering bees on banksias," Peter said.

"The mural is a bright and uplifting artwork to compliment the future community garden."

Both Jack and Daisy said opportunities like this help them strengthen their skills and get out of their comfort zones.

"By getting first-hand experience in the field and in the presence of

a professional, this gave me the underlying knowledge to allow me to apply myself in the field," Jack said. "It's always fun to see others' perspectives on the world and the industry."

"This opportunity grew my confidence as an artist as I learnt to embrace my creativity and get out of my comfort zone in painting which I know will help me in my future artworks," Daisy echoed. "It also offered a unique opportunity to learn from an experienced mural artist and collaborate with others who share an interest in art."

Now in its second year, the Town's Youth Mentorship Program gives young artists aged between 16-25 years the opportunity to grow their skills and gain valuable experience from a professional artist.







Volunteers to the rescue

Earlier in the year, the Town sought community feedback on the design of the park and the playground renewal and received many requests for a wheelchair and disability access playground options. Council supported this new infrastructure that will be installed early winter.

Claremont resident Luc Tasker said it's great that his son now gets to enjoy an accessible playground close to home.

"We are excited that our son Nathan will have the opportunity to experience joy in this playground like other children," Luc said.




Our library has a good selection of the shortlisted titles available to borrow — perfect for young readers of all ages to explore the best in Australian children's books.

Every child who gets involved will receive a fun little reward, like a bookmark, badge, or sticker, as a cheerful thank-you for joining the adventure!


